


One Hundred Years of Betty Debra Oswald



On the eve of her 100th birthday party, Betty tells us her story. Born into poverty in prewar London, and growing up fast during the Blitz, Betty grabs the chance at a bigger life by migrating to Australia.

On board the SS *Asturias* she meets three people who will influence the course of her life – Pearl, a good-hearted party girl, Athena, a Greek woman on her way to marry a man she has never met, and Leo, a German Jew who lost his family in the war.


But life has other plans for Betty, and soon she must find a way to do more than survive.

When a series of tragedies upend life as she knows it, Sadie is forced to dissect the past in order to confront the future, discovering family secrets and hard truths along the way.



Caroline's hidden agenda.



Her brother, Lincoln, is revelling in the culture of power and excess, and masterminding his ascendancy.




As tensions rise and conspiracies are forced to the surface, the truth behind the disappearance of Kick's high school friend comes into question, with each of them facing the complicity of their silence.





Rodney, a love-starved reader of romance novels and a dreamer is George's right-hand man and playing a long game, finding acceptance into the Maskey family on his own terms.

Leonora becomes increasingly involved with Anna and her family and has a strong influence on Anna's daughter Lydia, introducing her to literature and art.


This is a novel about the ways we all long for acceptance and the ways in which those we might feel most in touch with – including parents, siblings and mentors – can often have very different values and views about us.



Beatrice's reality is upended when she loses her sight. While her mathematician husband is away at work at Columbia or visiting the Metropolitan Museum of Art, she wanders through their empty house north of New York City and allows her mind to drift into unexpected and painful places.

There are solid guideposts for her along the way—
remembered paintings and novels to contemplate;
memories of her husband, children, and parents; her
close friendship with a neighbor—but her fragmented
thoughts often rabbit-hole in a dozen directions,
offering an intimate and original portrait of a mind
in motion.

Blindness has isolated Beatrice, removed her from what she can verify with her own eyes, but it also may offer her a gateway into new possibilities—a "re-visioning" of her world.


Three people form an unlikely but spirited connection.
