



As Shandell peers through her telescope and fills her notebooks, her conviction grows: the long-feared kidnapper has been hiding in plain sight.





However, the situation escalates when the influential Pregel family steps in. Known for fiercely protecting their interests, they only know one way to defend: attack.



In order to clear his name and flush out which member of this remote community took justice into their own hands, he will need to expose every secret, including his own.





But the staff never considered one thing: wronged girls grow into angry women. And some wounds demand justice.


