# Jazz Money & Jason Phu **The Frog's First Song**

A playful picture book about the joys of belonging and community from award-winning Wiradjuri poet Jazz Money and four-time Archibald Prize finalist Jason Phu.

First, the world is all dark. A little bit muddled and confused. The only sounds dripping water and small bubbles gurgling. In that darkness and quiet, everyone is alone. This is the world in the well.

And so begins the tale of how frogs came to croak in chorus at night-time. Inspired by Chinese parables and First Nations Creation stories, this debut picture book is a unique and melodic ode to taking chances, using your voice and coming together in song and dance.




**Jazz Money** is a Wiradjuri poet and artist whose work spans installation, digital, performance, film and print. Their writing has been widely published nationally and internationally, and performed on stages around the world. Jazz has published

two award-winning collections of poetry, how to make a basket (UQP, 2021) and mark the dawn (UQP, 2024). The Frog's First Song is their first children's picture book.



**Jason Phu** is an artist working across a wide range of mediums, including printmaking, painting and performance. His work references folk tales, family history and funny jokes. Sometimes it includes imagery from comics, cartoons

and Chan paintings. He is a four-time finalist for the Archibald Prize and won the Sulman Prize in 2015.




Then one day she meets someone who is different to the other visitors. Juno's busy brain buzzes with so many questions and thoughts that Houdini's skin tingles with wonder.



It's 1948 and Nabila Yasmeen lives a happy life in her village in Palestine. She plays in the hills with her friend Khalil and climbs high in the olive trees to pick the sweetest fruit. But when bombs start falling, Nabila and her family are forced to leave. Where will they go?

Embellished with beautiful line illustrations by renowned Palestinian artist Baraa Awoor, *The Sunbird* is the poignant story of a little girl who just wants to go home.

A charming junior novel about finding your place in your family – and on the soccer field.



On top of that, Myra joins the school's soccer team, only to be put in the midfield. Nothing exciting ever happens there! Will Myra find the magic in the middle?

With a distinctive voice and vivid depictions of Myra's Indian heritage, this junior novel is a sweet exploration of family, culture and adapting to change.

A pacy historical YA thriller – think the bushranger version of *Fingersmith* by Sarah Waters.

1899, Western Australia. Gilberta Brady has been locked inside the Fremantle Asylum for 'morbid sensuality' for the past three years. If she can prove that she's recovered, she might be released back to her family. The doctor puts her in charge of colony girl Norah, who's beset with delusions about having witnessed a homicide.

When Gilberta is inadvertently caught up in Norah's escape plan, the two inmates find themselves in the unforgiving bush. They meet Nyungar brothers, Miro and Djarraly, who are on their own journey home, and form a bushranger gang to track down a serial killer: the cop who murdered Norah's mother. But it turns out that the cop is also tracking them ...

Riveting, action-packed multi-POV adventure, with a dash of queer romance.

Meg Caddy is a West Australian YA novelist with three published novels. Meg started their first novel, a standalone YA fantasy titled *Waer*, when they were just fourteen, and *Waer* was acquired by Text Publishing after being shortlisted for the Text Prize in 2013. In 2017, *Waer* was also shortlisted for the CBCA Book of the Year Award. Their second novel, *Devil's Ballast*, was longlisted for the CBCA Book of the Year Award and shortlisted for the Readings Young Adult Book Prize (2020). The sequel *Slipping the Noose* was also longlisted for both the CBCA Book of the Year Award (2023) and the ARA Historical Novel Prize (2022).




### **Kid**



A raucous middle-grade romp featuring a creepy-cute character from debut author Allison Rocca's First Nations culture.

Eleven-year-old larrikin Joey left his last school in disgrace. He hopes that starting at a new school on Country will be a fresh start – he's going to stay out of trouble this time. But at the creek, he gains the attention of a Junjardy – a small hairy mischief-maker.

At first the creature's practical jokes are fun, but they soon spiral out of control, and Joey ends up in big trouble. How can Joey stop the Junjardy when he doesn't know the first thing about being a strong, proud Wakka Wakka boy?

**Allison Rocca** is a primary school teacher who has taught in classrooms from the 'burbs of Australia, to remote villages in Asia and Hogwarts-like academies in Oxford. She is a descendant of Wakka Wakka and Kaanju people and her upbringing was rich in storytelling. Allison likes to draw on the stories passed down by her highly respected Elder grandparents to write fiction for children and young adults. She lives and writes on Yuggera/Turrbal country, Brisbane.

Brenton E. McKenna is a Yawuru artist and writer from Broome who fell in love with comic books at a young age. He studied visual arts at Goulburn TAFE, and in 2011 became the first ever published Indigenous graphic novelist with the release of *Ubby's Underdogs: The Legend of the Phoenix Dragon*. When he's not drawing, Brenton dedicates his time to educating young people through creative storytelling workshops.



Based on the author's treasured childhood memories of attending the Harbin Ice and Snow Festival in China, this picture book is a spectacular ode to celebrating family and cultural traditions.

A grandpa takes his two beloved grandchildren to experience the wonder of Harbin's Ice and Snow World. It's an enchanting place filled with huge ice sculptures lit up by multi-coloured lights. They go down a super icy slide and eat ice cream even though it's minus thirty degrees!

Told in English and simplified Chinese, this picture book captures the fun of the winter festival and of spending time with loved ones.

Angie Cui, originally from China, embarked on her Australian journey at eighteen. She lives in Melbourne with her husband and two children, whom she calls the 'ABC Family' – a fusion of four individuals and three cultures. Imbued with a profound appreciation for the linguistic richness within her family, Angie finds delight in weaving tales through various languages.

Anna Wilson was born in Australia's Snowy Mountains, spent her childhood moving houses and schools, and then spent most of her adult life travelling the world. 

Theo is having a terrible time on a Pacific cruise with his dad, new stepmum and annoying stepsisters. The twins keep hassling him while Lyn acts like she wishes he didn't exist. But things get a whole lot worse when he's thrown overboard in a storm and washes up on an uninhabited island. Will his family find him? And when? How is he going to survive?

As Theo settles into castaway life – finding food, water and shelter – he discovers that the mysterious island is full of dodos. They are not extinct, like everyone thinks, but thriving away from human contact. Theo is more determined than ever to rescue himself. And if he takes a dodo with him, he'll be rich and famous and no-one will be mean to him ever again. But to escape the island, Theo will need to learn its secrets – and discover a few important truths along the way.

Samantha Wheeler fell in love with animals when, at the age of six, she received a tortoise. She went on to study agriculture, work with dairy farmers and teach science, until writing her first children's book, inspired by koalas, in 2011. Her books, which include Smooch & Rose, Mister Cassowary, Wombat Warriors, Turtle Trackers, Everything I've Never Said and Devils in Danger, have been shortlisted for the Queensland Literary Awards, the Readings Children's Book Prize, the Wilderness Society's Environment Award for Children's Literature and the Royal Zoological Society of New South Wales Whitley Awards. Samantha hopes her books will encourage everyone to make a difference.





# **Green Farms:**How regenerative agriculture can feed and heal the world

From the Young Farmer of the Year comes this vibrantly illustrated picture book for readers 7–11 about how to heal the planet through regenerative farming.

Farming affects all of us – even if we live in cities. Every bite of food we take connects us to the farm that grew it. In this detailed yet accessible picture book, award-winning farmer, scientist and storyteller Dr Anika Molesworth takes young readers through the farming and food system. She looks at farming challenges and how these can be solved through regenerative farming techniques like crop rotation, holistic grazing, agroforestry and fire management. The book also includes First Nations approaches to agriculture and caring for Country.

With charming illustrations, fact bubbles, fun activities and a glossary, *Green Farms* aims to educate and empower children to take an active role in supporting sustainable farming practices.

**Dr Anika Molesworth** is a passionate advocate for sustainable farming, environmental conservation and climate change action. Hailing from her family's sheep station near Broken Hill on Wilyakali land, Anika is an agroecologist with a Masters of Sustainable Agriculture, and a PhD in Agricultural Science. She has been working in international agricultural development for the past six years, giving her a holistic perspective of agricultural issues at a global scale.
